Leo F. Dupere, Sr. 1940 - 2020

Amesbury lost an icon this year with the passing of Leo Dupere, Sr, affectionately known as Coach Dup. An incredibly talented athlete, he spent decades teaching and coaching in the Amesbury school system, leaving an unforgettable imprint on his students and athletes.


When people say that Coach Dupere touched the lives of thousands of people, that's not an exaggeration. His love of teaching and coaching was apparent to all of his students and to this community, and he was named "Coach of the Year" three times by the Cape Ann Hockey League.

Coach Dupere was an accomplished athlete. Most well-known for the time he spent on the Amesbury Maples, he also played for Northeastern University, the Lynnfield Bruins and the Eastern Olympics Hockey team.

He was honored many times throughout his life; inducted into the Northeastern University Athletics Hall of fame, the Massachusetts State Hockey Coaches Association Hall of Fame, and one of the first in the Amesbury High School Athletics Hall of Fame. He's also one of the few Amesbury athletes to have their number retired - #13.

If you were a student or athlete of his, you likely had a nickname. Possibly you earned a silver dollar after completing his "Silver Dollar Throw", by throwing a ball into his open glove without him having to move.

After he retired, he enjoyed spending his time at yard sales and antiquing.



FY20 Accomplishments

The School Committee saw a major change at the start of 2020 with five new members taking their oath. In February, they started the Massachusetts Association of School Committees' (MASC) District Governance Workshop Program. It consists of 5 workshops; Building the Foundation (Operating Protocols), Raising the Frame (Vision & Goals), Installing the Infrastructure (Monitoring Progress), Setting the Walls (Effective Meetings), and Laying the Roof (Sustaining Progress). Additionally, the Committee worked with the Superintendent to adopt the Indicator Rubric for the Superintendent Evaluation Process developed by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE).



We have a very passionate group of people on the School Committee. Everyone brings a different perspective, while all focusing on doing what's best for the students of Amesbury. We have very high expectations for our School District and we're working to create policies and procedures to ensure success for the future. I know we have a lot of work to do to make sure we're investing in our schools, our teachers and our students, and we're all committed to making that happen.

In December 2019, we were one of seven housing authorities to receive an award of \$2.3 M for the Powow Villa 2 senior housing development through the ModPHASE Grant (Modernizing Public Housing and Supporting Elders program). This award will preserve public housing units and improve the lives of senior residents. Powow Villa 2 will undertake major rehabilitation projects to address capital needs and improve accessibility to better support aging-in-community for senior residents. In January 2020, we were awarded Health & Safety funds to be able to remove large tree limbs from power lines, remove trees that have deteriorated, repair miscellaneous pot holes and repair miscellaneous concrete steps. In February 2020 we were awarded \$50,000 for the Regional Resident Service Coordinator Initiative Funding Program in collaboration with Merrimac, Newburyport and West Newbury Housing Authorities. The four Housing Authorities will be sharing the Resident Service Coordinator to provide resident services for 465 State Aided Public Housing units which houses approximately 650 residents in all four Housing Authorities.

In the past year, we have improved our properties with several capital assessment projects to include replacement of new windows and paving and sidewalk repairs at our Multifamily development, emergency water pipe replacement at our Heritage Towers development, exterior repairs to our Administration Building, Bulkhead replacement to our Veterans Family Housing development and installation of ADA automatic door to our 30 Field Street location and Heritage Towers development.

Looking Ahead

As we move forward we continue to fill our vacant units and maintain our developments to provide affordable, safe and secure housing for those most in need. We are excited to begin our ModPHASE project at our Powow Villa 2 development in 2021 with major rehabilitation to address capital needs and improve accessibility to better support aging-in-community for senior residents as well as other capital improvements to include bathroom sink replacement at our Veterans family housing, concrete step repair at our Powow Villa 1 senior housing and re-paving and catch basin replacement at both our Veterans family housing and Powow 1 and 2 developments.

Under the City's local zoning ordinances, the Planning Board is responsible for all projects requiring site plan review and approval. The Board is the special permit granting authority in approximately 75% of the cases where special permits are required under the ordinance, with the Zoning Board of Appeals being responsible for the remainder. The Planning Board also has responsibility for all sign permits. Finally, the Board is the primary local Board responsible for land use planning and conducts public hearings for proposed zoning amendments.

Projects reviewed by the Planning Board in FY20 included...

- **Global Properties / Maples Crossing, South Hunt Road**
 - Throughout FY20, the Maples Crossing project included many modification requests as new property was acquired and changed the scope of the project. The project received an earth work permit in September 2019, and another in early FY21 for the Sports Park site.
- **Village at Bailey's Pond, Summit Avenue and Route 150**
 - Many years in the making, The Bailey's Pond Project has been ongoing since it received final approval in 2017. In FY20, a new developer bought the development rights and has worked diligently with the Board to upgrade the house designs, site amenities, and landscaping of the project. Working as a team, the Planning Board and the developer have made strides to advance construction.
- **Horace Mann School, 8-10 Congress Street**
 - The City of Amesbury awarded Wojcicki Development the Horace Mann property in FY20 to restore and rehabilitate the building to create 10 residential units. The project received a Historic Preservation Special Permit. The building is being fully restored and the exterior will be permanently preserved. Other items including landscaping and site improvements will further enhance the residential neighborhood. The project was approved on April 13, 2020 and is currently under construction.
- **Other Projects**
 - The recently sold church at 140-142 Main Street was approved for commercial uses. The Board worked with the developer to preserve both the Church and the Parsonage house. In addition, the Planning Board has approved 2 single family units on Bartlett & Rosedale Street, CNA Stores' marijuana retail store at 77 Macy Street, two marijuana manufacturing facilities at 57 South Hunt Road and 35 Buttonwood Road. Through the Board's encouraging effort, construction started or will soon start on a 2 lot subdivision at 68 Fern Avenue and a 3 lot subdivision at 1 Moncrief Street.

Under the authority of the Board of Trustees, the Amesbury Public Library strives to provide the best possible resources and services to fulfill the educational, cultural, personal development, social, and recreational needs of the community.

The Library Board of Trustees works closely with the Library Director on library operations, the annual budget, building maintenance and preservation.

FY20 projects and considerations included...

- **Front Door Restoration** - The iconic front doors of the Library, with beautifully carved lions, were sent off for a full restoration in FY20. Learn more about this project and their progress on page 122.
- **Adding a Fax Machine** - After a local business closed who provided fax services to the community, the Library added this as another service for library patrons to utilize.
- **General Building Maintenance** - Purchased a new dehumidifier for the lower level of the Library, identified a leak in the foyer to be fixed, added a handrail outside the staff entrance and began planning for a new storage area in the lower level as a result of the Building Inspector's report and issues found.
- **COVID-19 Closure** - Working with the Director on issues regarding COVID-19; closing the building, necessary safety upgrades to be made, obtaining Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) in preparation for bringing staff back into the building, and ensuring that the Library is following protocols and guidelines for book / item quarantine.
- **FY21 Budget** - The Trustees worked with the Director to put together the FY21 budget request, which shifted into the Continuing Appropriations Budget (CAB) process. The group discussed possible cuts to make to achieve level-funding for FY21.

The Amesbury Elementary School Building project moved forward in FY20, with the committee holding monthly public meetings and a smaller group holding weekly working group sessions. Mayor Gove reconstituted the committee's membership to ensure that all seats were filled and to be inclusive of all demographics impacted by this project.

The project reached 60% design during FY20, with the committee reviewing the site plan, materials used, landscaping, security, technology, and more. Public hearings were opened with the Planning Board and the Conservation Commission. Read more about the project's progress on page 30.

During FY20, the City of Amesbury also bonded \$30M of the project costs. The City was able to lock in a competitive interest rate, even during the volatile bond market due to COVID-19. This was in part due to the City's AA long-term bond rating assigned by S&P Global Ratings in early 2020.

FY20 Accomplishments

- Opened 116 public hearings, conducted 32 administrative discussions, and held one special meeting on a variety of proposals ranging from multi-million dollar projects such as an elementary school to a sports facility to backyard landscaping projects.
- Protected public health by permitting the treatment of Lake Attitash, the city's secondary drinking water supply, to eliminate the threat of cyanobacteria.
- Facilitated and coordinated the efforts to work with applicants to ensure their proposals were in compliance with state and local wetlands regulations.
- Coordinated efforts with other municipal entities such as Planning Board, Lakes & Waterways and the Open Space, Natural Resources and Trails Committee to ensure a seamless management approach to managing assets.
- Assisted property owners with technical information to guide them through the wetlands permitting process.

The Amesbury Municipal Contributory Retirement System was established in 1936 and is one of 104 contributory retirement systems for public employees within the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The retirement system covers all town employees and certain school employees working more than 20 hours per week, as well as any employees of the Amesbury Housing Authority. A retirement benefit is available to the members of the system after at least 10 years of employment and after reaching the age of 55 if hired prior to April 02, 2012 or age 60 for members hired after April 02, 2012.

The Amesbury Retirement Board provides a comprehensive annual report regarding the financial condition of the system, including a full and correct exhibit of all assets, liabilities, income and disbursements, of any changes in fund balances, and of the conditions and affairs of the system. To date the System is 60.1% funded and is expected to be fully funded by 2035.

FY20 Projects and Looking Ahead

- The two benches at Justin Park (across from the Middle School) fell into disrepair. VFW Post 2016 will fund the replacing of a wooden bench with a permanent granite bench, hopefully for Memorial Day 2021.
- The cannon at the Franco-American War Memorial on Friend St. was shrink-wrapped over the winter to protect from corrosive salt damage.
- The flag pole at that Memorial was looked at to be replaced but because of the structure of the memorial it was decided that it would be best to re-paint the flagpole. That paint job is pending.





Fiscal Year 2020 saw a change in the Mayor's Office, as Mayor Ken Gray finished his term and Mayor Cassandra Gove stepped into the role. Mayor Gove brought with her a set of goals for the office and for the City, which include:

Prioritizing communication and transparency.

Mayor Gove has focused on having an open door policy for staff, residents and business owners. All are welcome to call for an appointment, or walk in and meet with the Mayor when she is available. She holds regular Department Head meetings to ensure that the leadership team is on the same page with projects and programs, and information is being shared with all City staff.

Mayor Gove hired a Communications Director to improve overall communication and increase messaging from every department in the City, including through the City's website, social media channels, newly launched e-newsletters, press releases and physical signage.

Looking Ahead - Communication and Transparency

The FY21 budget invests in platforms like ClearGov, OpenGov and SeeClickFix to improve how we share financial documents, and how businesses, residents and contractors interact with us. We'll also be upgrading the website to be more streamlined and user friendly.

Have a student-centered focus on education.

This past school year ended in a way that none of us expected, and our teachers worked hard to transition quickly and continue to support our students. At every step, Mayor Gove and the School Committee were heavily engaged and focused on the student impacts. Mayor Gove has attended every School Committee and Amesbury Elementary School Building Committee meeting since taking office. She also spent time with Mrs. Fuller's American Government class talking about local politics, and read to AES and Cashman students on Read Across America Day!

An exciting change voted on by the School Committee is a new schedule at Amesbury High School. As we continue to look at our attrition rate and at how we can keep Amesbury students in district, this new schedule - with more interesting and modern classes - is a step in the right direction to providing more diverse class offerings, to appeal to a wider group of students.



Looking Ahead - Education

- Mayor Gove requested an AES Implementation Committee to be formed, which should begin meeting in October / November of 2020. The group will be tasked with looking at all aspects of the new school, including curriculum changes, district-wide grade reconfiguration, transportation, and more.
- We're looking forward to investing in technology at the schools. We received a \$50k security grant for the schools and we're awaiting state bond funding to be released for IT upgrades at the schools.
- The School Committee will complete its MASC training, and ensure that goals for the School Committee, the district and the Superintendent are aligned.

Amesbury residents voted to change the Charter from a Board of Selectman and Town Meeting style of government to the current Mayor and City Council format in 1996, with 2,085 voting in favor and 1,610 against.

Thoughtful Economic Development

There are many components to successful economic development, and in FY20 we focused on a few key areas, including:

- Strong push to get new volunteers on boards, commissions and committees like the Conservation Commission, Cultural Council, Historical Commission, Economic Incentives Committee and more. Having strong, dedicated volunteers makes a huge difference for City and economic development projects.
- Put together a Complete Count Committee for the 2020 Census, to ensure that we had responses from every demographic in our community, which impacts important federal funding and representation in Congress.
- Created the Business Economic Adjustment Team (BEAT, learn more on page 105) to help Amesbury's businesses impacted by COVID-19. We're heavily focused on helping and keeping the businesses we have here already.
- With the Amesbury Cultural Council, we started the "It's Electric" mural program, to paint nine electrical boxes around Amesbury plus the secure dropbox in front of City Hall. Public art is an important piece of economic development; proven to lower crime, and increase walkability and tourism.

Looking Ahead - Economic Development

Mayor Gove has taken a close look at our organizational structure to see where changes can be made in order to increase efficiency. Beginning this fall / winter, the Office of Community and Economic Development, and Inspectional Services (building and health) are moving to 39 South Hunt Road to share offices with the Department of Public Works. These departments work together frequently for development projects in Amesbury, and this move allows for more collaboration as well as ease of use for residents and stakeholders who need to do business with them.

The Office of Community and Economic Development is also investing in online permitting software, which will make the entire permitting process much easier for everyone involved.

Mayor's Office Interns

Maya Gakidis started an internship with Mayor Gove in January, which unfortunately was cut short due to COVID-19. Maya was heavily involved with organizing our boards, and the MVP Grant project.

Abbie Anderson worked on various projects including researching the new gates for Lake Gardner and reading through Council bills for the Charter Review Commission. Investing in Infrastructure

It's critical that we invest in our roads, buildings and network infrastructure to ensure long-term success. In FY20, we saw the beginning of the long-awaited Elm Street Reconstruction project (read more on page 102), and received a MassWorks grant for \$300k to reconfigure two major intersections in town. We also completed a cybersecurity audit with the Massachusetts National Guard (read more on page 90), to gather information about what we need to invest in when it comes to our information technology network.

Looking Ahead - Infrastructure

As we move into FY21, we're focusing on a few projects related to infrastructure. The fields project will continue to move forward alongside the AES building project, while making sure we're keeping the big picture in mind. We're looking at Lake Gardner usage moving forward, and how to better monitor the area for crowding. We'll be installing a new, automatic gate with a permit system for residents and non-residents. And finally we're taking a close look at our empty buildings to make better use of them, including the Cultural Center in the Upper Millyard and the Elm Street Fire Station.



Other Projects, Initiatives and Community Events

- Attended the Massachusetts Municipal Annual Meeting and Trade Show in January
- Chief of Staff Paul Fahey successfully negotiated contracts with the Fire and Police unions
- Recognized all City staff on Employee Appreciation Day in early March
- Many departments participated in the Amesbury High School Career Fair
- Organized our volunteer boards, commissions and committees, recruited more volunteers (21 in FY20)
- Helped place flags on Veteran graves for Memorial Day with Veterans' Services
- Working on establishing a consistent HR process; re-writing the personnel policy, making our hiring and interview process consistent
- Making sure our public meetings are on the City Calendar well in advance
- Making our budget book and annual report easy to read and understand, and designed to encourage readership

PROJECT HIGHLIGHT:

Amesbury Elementary School Building Project

The Amesbury Elementary School Building project had been an idea for more than a decade, but became a reality on October 8, 2019, when Amesbury residents voted in favor of building a new AES at 193 Lions Mouth Road. The project received the green light and moved forward with more concrete plans.

Since then, the Building Committee has met monthly to discuss various components of the project and move the overall design plans forward. Mayor Gove reconstituted the Building Committee in early 2020 to ensure that each seat was represented and brought a unique perspective to the table.

Currently, the new AES is slated to open in early 2023.



Project Milestones in FY20 Include:

- The October 8, 2019 vote to approve the project, location and funding
- Project Scope and Funding Agreement with the MSBA completed
- 60% Design documents complete and submitted to the MSBA
- City of Amesbury bonded \$30M for the project
- Held the first abutter / neighborhood meeting to discuss the project and open communication




Fiscal year 2020 was a challenging year for all with the COVID-19 pandemic and the resulting fiscal impact that was felt throughout our community and the world. Early on in the pandemic, we in the Administration & Finance Department assessed and planned for a worse case fiscal impact to the city by anticipating a significant reduction in revenues, freezing discretionary spending, projecting available cash flows, and investigating the possibility of temporary loans. We performed numerous iterations of a potential FY21 operating budget and ultimately chose to utilize the statutory option of a Continuing Appropriations Budget (CAB) or 1/12th budget for the first three months of the new fiscal year. This option allowed the city to align its budget process with that of the state while the much anticipated state aid allocation was in flux. We are happy to report that these strategies, along with sound fiscal planning allowed Amesbury to maintain a stable fiscal position throughout these difficult times. The team's dedication to policy and planning along with the city's fiscal strength was confirmed by the continued "AA" S&P bond rating which was awarded in the midst of the pandemic.

The Office of the Assessor is responsible for the fair and accurate listing and assessment of all real estate and personal property for taxation purposes, in accordance with state statutes and regulations. We assist taxpayers in determining eligibility for statutory property tax exemptions and in understanding the basis for all property tax assessments. We also carry out inspections of all building permits and sales throughout the year. We are responsible for the commitment of over 19,000 motor vehicle and boat excise tax bills during the year, based on data received from the Registry of Motor Vehicles, Massachusetts Environmental Police, local marinas, and assist taxpayers with the adjustment of their bills.



Massachusetts General Law requires the City of Amesbury to value property for tax purposes annually as of January 1st preceding the start of the July 1st fiscal year for which property taxes will be levied. Once every five years the Department of Revenue certifies the valuation of local assessments at “full and fair cash value” with on-site examination. This is referred to as the “certification year”. The four intervening years are referred to as the “interim years”, during which the Department of Revenue review of required annual valuation adjustments is done by desk review and required submitted documentation. Fiscal year 2020 was the third of the four interim years.

FY20 and Looking Ahead

We are currently working on directives as set forth by the Bureau of Local Services for our Certification year. Our mission is to provide fair and equitable assessments throughout the community for all the residents and taxpayers of the City of Amesbury. In this very difficult budget year, we have worked relentlessly to provide a fair budget that will maintain the high quality of services we have always provided to the residents and tax payers. The line items we have decreased will, we hope, have the least impact on the daily workings in this department. We will meet this challenge head on and do not anticipate any problems in doing so.

How is property value assessed?

In Massachusetts, valuation is based on “full and fair cash value” which is the amount a willing buyer would pay a willing seller on the open market. Assessors must collect, record and analyze a lot of information about property and market characteristics in order to estimate the fair market value of taxable properties in our community. Religious organizations, hospitals, government and educational institutions are also valued, though they are exempt from taxation. During FY20, our office was business as usual. While City Hall was closed for the end of the fiscal year, we continued to serve patrons with quality customer service on a daily basis. Due to COVID-19, we did waive all interest and fees on bills through June 30 in an effort to help people with those payments. We also installed a secure dropbox in front of City Hall so people could drop off payments safely and securely.

Our FY20 goals included enhancing the reconciliation process from our office to the Accounting Office using uniformed departmental turnover forms, which all City departments are now using. We also worked to strengthen security measures to safeguard City and taxpayer information. Our staff is partaking in a Security Education Platform program, and is also taking a mandatory cyber security training each month as part of the City-wide program. These security programs will continue into FY21.

Looking forward, it is our goal to maintain integrity in all functions, promoting positive morale and productivity throughout our office. We will continue to provide excellent customer service to taxpayers while protecting the interests of the City through diligent collection of all taxes due.

Tax Collections

Our office remains dedicated to collecting above 95% of the Real Estate, Personal Property and Motor Vehicle Excise taxes due each fiscal year. We continue our regular collections process to ensure delinquencies are managed in a timely and fair manner for all taxpayers. *The commitment amounts shown here include water and sewer liens.

John Dubuc was the Director of MIS during FY20, and retired in March. We appreciate everything he did during his tenure! Tim McCue became IT Director in September 2020, and John continued to assist during the transition.

FY20 presented unique challenges as COVID-19 put extra strain on our already aging technology system. The IT Department supports the City and the Schools, and has worked with City staff on remote access and the schools with making sure teachers have the bandwidth for distance learning.

Tim McCue has been reviewing all of our systems to be able to make recommendations for the future. With maintenance deferred for so many years, it's going to take time and funding to bring the City and schools to where we should be.

This department was previously called Management Information Systems (MIS), and has been re-named to Information Technology.

- Stabilize the current technical environment, and look to re-design the entire network and build more resiliency
- Work with various departments to bring in new platforms and technology, including Office365, ClearGov, OpenGov, SeeClickFix and more
- Replace wireless infrastructure across Amesbury Enterprise Network

- Consolidate Domain Controllers across Windows environment (18>2)
- Create an Identity and Access Management plan for on-premise and cloud identities
- Create sustainable hardware refresh schedules, as well as hardware platform and software patching schedules
- Create maintenance windows for all departments

PROJECT HIGHLIGHT:

Cybersecurity Initiatives

During FY20, the City began two major initiatives related to cybersecurity; training for all City staff and a professional audit by the Cybersecurity Unit of the Massachusetts National Guard.

Staff Training

Starting in January 2020, all City staff were prompted to begin a year-long cybersecurity training. Through educational videos, short quizzes and test spam emails, everyone has been learning more about keeping our network safe and secure.

National Guard Cybersecurity Review

Former Director of Information Technology John Dubuc, who is also a member of the National Guard, worked through the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) to have a cybersecurity review and scan of the Amesbury IT network done by the Guard's CyberSecurity unit, at no charge to the City.

The City of Amesbury is the first municipality in the Commonwealth to receive this service, which scanned 1,130 endpoints with Shodan and Nessus in early June. The National Guard then briefed the Mayor and City IT staff on recommendations to improve the system's security. One such recommendation was for the City to migrate to an online email system like Office365, which the City will implement later in 2020.

Major Karmin Ng, Deputy Chief of Staff, Information Management for the Massachusetts National Guard, worked on the project and said, "The Massachusetts National Guard is always ready to assist the people of the Commonwealth. At the request of the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency we conducted the review for the City of Amesbury. Ensuring cybersecurity is vital as government utilizes cutting edge informational technology to conduct normal and emergency operations. This IT review is a great example of state and local agencies working together to create solutions for a modern and evolving concern."

We were faced with new and more difficult issues with limited information and a shortage of critical supplies. The firefighters and members of Emergency Management stepped up to meet our new reality. In the end this year ends up the same as many others. The fire, EMS, and EMA personnel adjust to the new normal and continue to provide the City with exceptional service.

AFD's administrative offices will be moving out of the Ordway Building and into the former Elm Street Fire Station at 124 Elm Street!

Even with a Pandemic playing out across our Nation our normal calls for service still continued. We still responded to fire calls, medical calls, automobile accidents, and odors of gas in buildings... just to name a few. On the Emergency Management side, we participate in Seabrook Nuclear power plant drills and the team shows up to support overnight or ongoing efforts as needed. We assist with large events like the Christmas parade and Fourth of July Fireworks, participate in community events such as the Chili Cook-off, Heart to Heart and Downtown Trick-or-Treat, and provide an informational hotline during snow storms and other natural disasters.

COVID-19 Response

The Fire Department took a leading role in ensuring that all City Staff and Departments were well-informed, trained, and supplied with the appropriate Personnel Protective Equipment for re-opening. As an organization, we take great pride in ensure the health and safety of not only ourselves but all members of our community.

Our team was extremely diligent about checking and tracking symptoms and temperatures to ensure that we would not have an outbreak of COVID-19 in our department. As first responders, many of our calls have been COVID related which means we are exposed often. Due to the team's diligence, we only had one case of COVID-19 within our department early in the pandemic.

We opened the Emergency Operations Center as a hub of information and assistance during COVID-19. The EOC was open Monday - Friday, 8am - 4pm. Residents and businesses could call to have questions answered, or to sign up for the food delivery program that we jointly started with the Council on Aging and Recreation Department.

Chief Berkenbush, as Director of Emergency Management, led the City's response team meetings which included the Mayor, Police, Fire, Health and Public Works. The group met daily at the beginning of the pandemic to discuss ongoing cases and guidance, and ensure that everyone was on the same page about the City's response and keeping citizens safe.

We would like to thank all of the community members who made masks for our department, working to ensure our health and safety as first responders. We're incredibly grateful for the support of our community during this extremely tough time.

FY20 has proved to be an interesting year for the Amesbury Police Department. The year began as years past and we anticipated continuing our involvement with the community as we had been, providing the same services to our residents. Shortly after the beginning of 2020, all of that changed and we were forced to adjust almost everything we do! Many of our programs and calls for service involve personal contact with the community, and when this was no longer possible to do safely we quickly transitioned our response plans and progressed to a virtual world for much of our public interaction.

For the first time since Chief Scholtz became Chief, the full-time ranks at the Amesbury Police Department are fully staffed! Classes are offered in the following areas: law, behavioral science, forensic science, understanding terrorism/terrorist mindsets, leadership, communication, and health/fitness. Officers participate in a wide range of leadership and specialized training, where they share ideas, techniques, and experiences with each other, creating lifelong partnerships that transcend state and national borders. Graduates of this course represent approximately 1% of law enforcement executives.



FY20 saw major changes in our operating environment, as facilities were closed to the public for an extended duration due to COVID-19. However, Public Works was able to deliver essential functions and transition to assist the City in navigating a difficult end to the year.

Department Goals

For FY20, our major goal was the implementation of roughly \$1.6M in local construction projects. All divisions were involved in this effort, and Public Works was able to complete the projects assigned on time and on budget.

These projects included drain work, finalizing appraisals and plans for Elm Street Reconstruction, building the beach wall at Lake Gardner, and paving 33 roads throughout Amesbury.

Our focus for FY21 will shift from construction to asset management and data acquisition. Our goal is to update all existing asset plans and ensure we have a number of shovel ready projects in anticipation of future funding.

Public Works Divisions

The Department of Public Works is responsible for the maintenance and improvement of all City infrastructure, consisting of the following divisions:

- Administration
- Engineering
- Facilities
- Public Services
- Garage
- Recycling, Compost and Refuse
- Sewer
- Snow and Ice
- Water Treatment
- Water Distribution



Administration

This division handles work requests, issues work orders and plans, sets policy, handles procurement, payroll and accounts payable and is responsible for the overall direction of the department.

Engineering

Engineering handles the technical aspects of the department's work. This includes surveys, design, review and inspection of the various elements of work. This division also manages the City's watershed and water control structures, such as dams.

Recycling, Compost and Refuse

The City of Amesbury contracts with G. Mello Disposal Corp for our trash and recycling pickup.

- Solid Waste Tonnage: 4,632
- Total Waste Recycled: 28%

This division runs the Compost Facility at 60 South Hunt Road, open Thursday - Sunday from April through December each year.



- Yard Waste and Brush: 500 tons

Snow and Ice

The Public Services division is responsible for all plowing and removal of snow from streets, parking lots, sidewalks, and public buildings including schools. Snow operations include salting, sanding, scraping, pushing back and removal of snow piles. Approximately 50% of snow plowing is done by contractors.

Garage

The team at the Garage handles all vehicle maintenance functions for Public Works, the Police Department and Animal Control.



Facilities

This division conducts maintenance and improvements to Amesbury's public buildings and other structures. This includes winterizing, roof and pipe freeze-up inspections, inspection of traffic light boxes, maintenance of irrigation systems, emergency lighting, fire extinguishers and assists the Public Services division with minor tree work. Some projects in FY20 included repairing roofs and gutters on several buildings, building picnic tables, and building sneeze shields for City departments.



Public Services

Public Services maintains the roadways, sidewalks, drainage systems, catch basins, drain and sewer manholes, signs, traffic controls, lighting, trees and tree grates, compost facility, cemeteries and parks. A few of their projects in FY20 included:

- Setting up for special events, City meetings and Elections
- Schedule and monitor contractors for street sweeping, line painting, various projects
- Line painting for crosswalks, stop bars, arrows, parking spaces
- Street sweeping: 40 lane miles
- Street Name signs installed: 18
- Safety and regulatory signs installed: 56
- Road paving and repair: Approx. 1,000 tons of hot top

Components of a Road

When we talk about re-paving roads, most often we're talking about just replacing the top layer of pavement to make the road smooth again and remove potholes. Occasionally, we take on a large project to completely redo the road from the base layer up (like the Elm Street Reconstruction project). A project like that typically costs about \$5M per mile, which includes materials and labor for sidewalks and roadway.

Wastewater / Sewer

The Wastewater division operates and maintains (O+M) the Amesbury Water Pollution Abatement Facility (AWPAF) located at 19 Merrimac Street, and over 55 miles of gravity and force mains located throughout the city. The staff also performs O+M on 28 pump stations located throughout the City of Amesbury.

The staff administers an Industrial Pretreatment Program as part of its compliance procedures in accordance with the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Stormwater Permit program. Under this program, the City permits the discharge of industrial process wastewater to the AWPAF in order to enforce not only locally imposed limitations but also federal guidelines. The staff conducts industrial sampling and inspections throughout the year. No violations were found this year. The AWPAF treated 607 million gallons of wastewater during the year. The staff is also responsible for sewer main blockages and breaks. The staff does monthly O+M on troublesome mains in the City by hydro-jetting those sections of pipe.

Water Treatment

We have 6 full-time and 1 part-time staff who operate the Water Treatment Facility at 12 Newton Road. Typically, June has higher water usage every year due to people water their lawns / gardens. Certainly COVID-19 added to the extra water usage this year, with more people staying at home.

Water Distribution

Water distribution repaired and installed pipes, valves, hydrants and does all work associated with the distribution system. Over the last few years, this group has also replaced water mains throughout the City. The big project they are focused on now is replacing residential water meters, as the old ones no longer work properly / read accurately.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHT: Elm Street Reconstruction

The conversation about the Elm Street Reconstruction Project started in 1998, and the project began in March 2020! We received \$10M in state and federal funding to complete the project, with the City of Amesbury adding roughly \$800,000 for design work and easements.

The project includes full pavement reconstruction, rehabilitation of the existing drainage system, the addition of new/rehabilitated sidewalks and curbing along both sides of the roadway, ADA compliant wheelchair ramps, 5' bicycle lanes, all new utility poles and improved intersections. Traffic lights will be added at the Congress Street and Monroe Street intersections.

The City held a public forum about this project on March 5, 2020 to provide updates about the project and answer questions from residents and business owners. To help share information and keep everyone up to date, the City created a website project page and routinely shares updates on the Public Works' Facebook page, the Amesbury Senior Newsletter, the Newburyport Daily News, Swift911, and in the City's e-newsletter.

The City created and printed lawn signs for residents on detour streets to remind people to drive slowly, and for businesses on Elm Street to remind people that they are still open for business during construction.



The project has been able to move faster than expected due to COVID-19 and fewer cars on the roadway. For project updates, follow Amesbury Public Works on Facebook (www.facebook.com/AmesburyDPW) or visit the project page on the City's website (www.amesburyma.gov/elm-street).

ENERGY + ENVIRONMENTAL AFFAIRS

During FY20, Thomas Barrasso was the Director of Energy and Environmental Affairs. During the FY21 budget process, that position was defunded. We would like to thank Tom for all of his work for the City of Amesbury during his tenure here. We remain committed to being a green and sustainable community, and will continue to make progress in this area.

FY20 Accomplishments

The City of Amesbury made strides in our overall efforts as a green community, and will continue these projects among others as we move forward under the umbrella of the Office of Community & Economic Development.

Streetlight Conversion

In August 2019, the City embarked on a project to retrofit all streetlights to LEDs. We purchased roughly 1,250 "cobra head" lights from National Grid and contracted with Arden Engineering Constructors of Rhode Island to handle the conversion. As of the end of FY20, we still have a handful of streetlights that need to be converted and funding is being identified for ongoing maintenance.

Titcomb Solar Field

In September 2019, work began on the Titcomb Solar Field on South Hunt Road. This 8-year project had its ribbon cutting in January 2020 after being developed by Kearsarge Energy. The solar array will reduce the release of carbon dioxide and other air pollutants while also producing electricity. It generates revenue for the City from Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT) and lease payments, as well as energy costs totaling nearly \$4 Million over the next 20 years.



At the time of this report, the Office of Energy & Environmental Affairs has been reorganized under the Office of Community & Economic Development.

Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness Project

In 2018, the City of Amesbury completed a vulnerability assessment and action-oriented resilience plan with funding from the Massachusetts Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness (MVP) Program. One of the recommendations was to complete an Open Space and Recreation Plan for the City. The Open Space, Natural Resources and Trails Committee was engaged to develop a comprehensive plan for protecting, preserving and enhancing the City's natural resources and open spaces. That plan was completed and approved in the Spring of 2020 and can be found on the Committee's webpage. In the Spring of 2020, the City also engaged the residents of Pleasant Valley Road in discussions about how they are currently being impacted, or anticipate being impacted in the future, by flooding and/or erosion along the Merrimack River. Funding to complete the study, if obtained, will come through the MVP Program. The results of this study and its resiliency improvement recommendations will help residents protect and manage their property and assist the City in ensuring a more resilient Amesbury for years to come.

The Inspections Department issues permits for work being done in the City of Amesbury and ensures that all buildings are in compliance with Amesbury's Zoning Bylaws and Ordinances, Massachusetts General Laws, Massachusetts State Building Code 8th Edition, International Building Code, the Architectural Access Board, National Electric Code with Mass. Amendments (NEC), the National Fire Protection Agency (NFPA 70) and Massachusetts Fuel, Gas & Plumbing Code.

Additionally, in accordance with 780CMR State Board of Building and Regulations Standards, Inspectional Services performs annual inspections of public buildings, churches, in-law apartments, and multi-unit dwellings.

COVID-19 did not have a major impact on the Inspectional Services Department during FY20, as permits continued to be issued during that timeframe.

Do You Need a Permit?

The need for a permit can be fairly subjective, based on the project details. For larger projects, like a new building or renovating an existing building, permits and inspections are needed. For smaller projects, such as a minor roof repair or replacing a few planks on a deck, it's likely that no permit is needed. We recommend that it's always better to be safe and give us a call before starting your project just to be sure! Always keep in mind that there are certain projects that you must hire a licensed professional for, including plumbing and gas work.

If you've hired a professional to do some work for you, make sure you check that they will handle the permitting process for you. Generally, it's easier for them to take care of the permits, which includes having them share information about their insurance and licenses.

After many years of service, Jack Morris resigned his position as Health Director. Mr. Morris served the City well and has been an integral part of this community for many years. The City of Amesbury would like to wish him well in his future endeavors.

COVID-19 Response

As the local enforcement agent, the Health Department in collaboration with the Board of Health, has been very focused on the COVID-19 pandemic since mid-March. We participated in the daily COVID-19 response team meetings with other City leadership, and in daily / weekly calls with local, regional, state and federal officials to get updates on the science of COVID-19 and updated guidance to share with the community.

We worked with local businesses to answer questions about regulations from the Commonwealth, and responded to complaints about compliance for masks, physical distancing and non-essential businesses. As part of the Business Economic Adjustment Team (BEAT, read more on [page XX](#)) we worked to support local businesses with re-opening.

Throughout the entire pandemic, our first priority was and continues to be the health and safety of everyone in our community. Information about the Coronavirus changed quickly, even from day to day, and we worked to make sure that City leadership had the most up-to-date information and guidance to be able to make the best decisions for this community.

The Coronavirus continues to impact our community and everything we do. This department will continue to share guidance and be a resource for Amesbury as we move through the pandemic.

COVID-19 by the Numbers

Since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Health Department and Fire Department have worked together to keep Amesbury residents safe and healthy. Our first responders also changed their protocols to keep themselves healthy, as they continued to serve the Amesbury community.

Our mission is to advocate for older adults, to identify their needs, to meet their health, economic, social and cultural needs, to encourage maximum independence and to improve their quality of life. One goal we had in FY20 was to increase the Council on Aging's presence in the community.

We accomplished this in a variety of ways, including:

- Hiring a new Program Coordinator (utilizing grant funds) with an extensive marketing background to help us improve our overall communications and marketing. Since then, our social media following has increased by 16% in one year.
- Building and maintaining strong relationships within the community, including with sponsors, first responders, community supporters and City leadership to keep our seniors interconnected amongst these groups, and providing updates on City programs and services available.



COVID-19 Impacts

It is necessary to acknowledge the impact that COVID-19 has had on the Amesbury Council on Aging (ACOA) and its members since March 2020. Due to the strong community relationships the ACOA has developed over the years, in times of crisis, the supports remain in place as we learn new ways to help seniors stay connected and receive the services they require. The ACOA began planning and offering virtual and outside programming that was fun- and also an opportunity to provide outreach and social connectedness. Breakfast with the Chiefs became Virtual Social Hour with the Chiefs, the monthly Low Vision Group met outside with the Community Police Liaison and Deputy Fire Chief attending. The ACOA staff adapted to working remotely and began making over 200 calls/week to check in with folks. Meals on Wheels remained intact serving about 80 meals/day- another opportunity for outreach. Brown Bag was now delivered rather than picked up.

July 2019 through Feb. 2020, (Pre-Covid) the ACOA flourished with innovative programming and outreach. Strong relationships with First Responders, sponsors and community supporters have allowed the ACOA to meet the needs of most of the residents 60 years of age or older and their families.

Programs and Services

EMHOT, Elder Mental Health Outreach Team supported by a Massachusetts Council on Aging (MCOA) grant, entered into its 4th year, assisting over 154 clients with their mental health related challenges. New community partnerships continue to be developed while existing collaborations are strengthened. The ACOA was able to hire a part time Case Manager through this grant allowing for continuity as the interns cycled through their time with us. Another part time position was funded through the MCOA grant, and allowed us to implement a Technology Loan program that began in May 2020 and grew to offer 3 types of devices (a total of 44) to help minimize loneliness and isolation. We will be presenting this pilot program at the virtual MCOA conference Oct 21 2020. Now more than ever, it's important to look for ways to stay connected for good mental health.



The Greenleaf Supportive Day Program is meeting an important need of the community and surrounding areas; providing respite for families while offering fun, engaging and meaningful activities for their loved ones. Reducing isolation and keeping people in their homes for as long as possible is the goal. Having a sustainable program is a challenge. With current shut downs due to the pandemic, the program is on a hiatus leaving many families on their own- a concerning situation. Calls and deliveries of activity packets are made regularly to support families.



The ACOA also provides health and wellness activities, nutrition and meals assistance, community education, social activities, arts and crafts, field trips and transportation services.

Our goals for FY21 include:

- Increase ACOA programming space
- Re-open to full capacity (pre-pandemic)
- Reinstate Greenleaf Supportive Day Program
- Obtain 12-person passenger van with lift
- Being designated an Age-Friendly Community by AARP





PROJECT HIGHLIGHT: Elder Support During COVID-19

While many of the City's departments were impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Council on Aging was uniquely impacted because the demographic served is at the highest risk for the virus. Doreen Arnfield and the team at the Council on Aging had to fully transition their programs from being in-person to being virtual, and think of new ways to keep Amesbury's seniors engaged and social.

COVID-19 Programming and Services Included:

- Working with the Emergency Management and the Recreation Department to create a volunteer system to do grocery shopping and deliveries for at-risk seniors
- Mailing roughly 3,000 Senior Newsletter each month to make sure information is being shared
- Dropping off puzzles to seniors in the area
- Making daily and weekly phone calls to check-in on Amesbury seniors
- Writing and mailing "Thinking Of You" cards
- Closing the gap with Meals on Wheels when they had to shut down due to a possible COVID-19 outbreak to ensure our seniors still got their weekly meals
- Creating virtual programming for social opportunities; Social Hour on Zoom, Game Time, Virtual Breakfast with the Chiefs and virtual tours (Boston, White Mountains, etc)
- Purchasing three canopies for outside programming. Exercise classes, support groups and other social groups have utilized the outdoors and found a new way of connecting
- Being a resource for seniors and the region. Doreen was included in the Foundation Trust's white paper, "In This Together: Helping Seniors Living with Chronic Conditions to Maintain Connections in Times of Isolation"

The Amesbury Veterans' Services Office is part of a regional program comprised of Amesbury, Newburyport, Salisbury and Merrimac. During the last year, with COVID-19 warping our world, we are proud that we were able to provide real-time answers when Veterans called our office. The buildings were closed to the public but we were still working inside. Part of our role is to help financially challenged Veterans and their families, which we continued to do throughout the pandemic.


The Veterans' Services Office assists Veterans with the Chapter 115 program, establishing disability claims, pension benefits, requests for paperwork, or intercession with and to the Department of Veterans' Affairs. We also oversee the placement of an American flag at the graves of the 2,500 Veterans buried in Amesbury's cemeteries every Memorial Day.

Chapter 115 Program

Over \$430,000 was provided to Amesbury Veterans and their families through the State-sponsored Chapter 115 program. This program provides financial assistance to Amesbury Veterans whose incomes fall below 200% of the federal poverty level. In addition to providing supplementary income to needy Veterans for living expenses and fuel costs, these benefits provide reimbursement for medical insurance premiums, dental procedures, Medicare Part B and D premiums, co-pays, medications, and various medical expenses not covered by health insurance. 75% of all Chapter 115 money is reimbursed to the City of Amesbury by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Sadly, we lose roughly 6% of our Veterans each year. We lost some great people this year, as it seems we do every year. Looking forward, the Veterans' Services Office will continue to serve our local Veterans and their families the best we can. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to give us a call.



Programs and Services

- Elementary Before and After School Programs, and Middle School After School Programs, providing care for children of many working families in the area. These programs keep kids safe and active, as well as providing homework help. The Middle School program also provides community service, life skills and local field trip opportunities.
- Our School Vacation programs provide a week-long tournament sports program to keep kids active and entertained during vacation weeks (April Vacation 2020 program was canceled due to COVID-19).
- Camp Kent Nature Center - Summer Nature Program, Low Elements Project Adventure Course, Kayaking, Sailing, Rowing, Archery, Family Programs, Camping and Bird Watching. The Camp Kent Summer Program consisted of participants in small groups with their peers enjoying environmental science, outdoor skills and adventure learning activities.
- Our Counselor in Training (CIT) program is offered to 14-15 year old Amesbury High School students who want to earn community service hours toward graduation requirements. **For summer 2019, we had 38 CITs earning a total of 1,687.75 hours.**
- Field trips for the 2019 Park Program included: Boston Duck Tour, Aquaboggin Water Park, Launch Trampoline Park, the Stone Zoo, Fisher Cats baseball game, and Candia Springs Water Park. These trips were held every Thursday for 7 weeks.
- The Teen Program for ages 11-14 ran Mondays - Thursdays, and consisted of mainly a field trip schedule. Those included Puzzling Adventures, Bean Stock Adventures and Zip-line, Gillette Stadium, New England Aquarium, Breakout Games and Canobie Lake Park. Every Wednesday the group traveled to a different local beach.

Programs and Services

- Lifeguards were on duty at Lake Gardner from 9:30am - 5:30pm, overseeing approximately 200 beach patrons per day. There were a total of 3 lifeguards who were hired for the 2019 summer season. They were trained in Red Cross Lifeguard Certification, as well as being CPR and First Aid Certified.
- Kids Day in the Park 2019 was the highest attended to date with well over 200 people in attendance! Events included lawn games with the CITs, Teddy Bear Parade, the Fisher Cats mascot, bounce house and obstacle course provided by local churches, Roaming Railroad train rides, Mad Science experiments, face painting, and an L.L. Bean outdoor adventure presentation. In attendance were representatives from Our Neighbors' Table, WIC, and the Amesbury Fire and Police Departments. Karen K and the Jitterbugs performed live music in the Pines thanks to a grant from the Amesbury Cultural Council. Donations of water from Home Depot in Seabrook and Plaistow, pizza from Amesbury Flatbread Company, ice cream from Hodgie's and beverages from Honest Tea were generously provided at no cost. This event was free for all to attend!
- During COVID-19, along with the daily videos we worked to create and share on social media, we also spearheaded the Amesbury's Got Talent virtual talent show. We put out a call for videos, collected the submissions, filmed the transition videos and worked with Amesbury Community Television to put together and show the final program on ACTV and Facebook. It was a competition, so we also tallied the results and announced the winners by age grouping.



FY20 started off to be a great year! We began the process of having our front doors restored, which we know will be a wonderful improvement to our historic building. We were able to add a public fax machine which was in high demand from our patrons, and we completed some smaller patron experience improvements such as adding a community puzzle table and offering reusable bags for checkout.



Impact of COVID-19

On March 16th, COVID-19 forced us to close our doors and re-think how we serve our patrons. We hoped it would be a short closure, but it lasted beyond the end of FY20. The safety of our patrons and staff has been and continues to be our number one priority. We began offering curbside service when it became safe to do so, at the end of June 2020.




FY21 Goals

We held a raffle for National Library Card Signup Month! We had **401** people sign up for new library cards in FY20.




We put up a story on the Riverwalk **3-4** times per year - our Storywalk!

The Library was closed or delayed **6** times in FY20 due to snow and weather.







Summer Reading Program




We promoted all of the online materials available to help encourage summer reading, and held a 10-week writing / drawing prompt series along with a journal giveaway.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHT:

Library Front Door Restoration

You may have noticed some changes happening on the original front entry of the 1901 library building. For the last year our front doors have been undergoing careful conservation to repair and restore both the doors and the intricately attractive surround.

Twice a year I conduct a walkthrough of the historic library building to document issues and impending projects. During our bi-annual visual inspection of the library in 2018, I identified the front doors, including the elaborate surround, as a critical preservation project. Exposure to weather and wear and tear on the original doors left them dry and brittle and at risk for deterioration beyond repair.

With no capital funds available from the City, the Board of Trustees voted to approve funding for this project through trust funds earmarked specifically for preservation projects. Proposals were requested from three conservators and the project was ultimately awarded to Freddy Roman of Period Craftsman, a well-regarded conservator who has worked with dozens of museums and historic sites in New England.

With support from the Trustees, the project began in May of 2019. Conservation is careful work. The doors were removed and stripping of the existing finish began. Because the doors had not been treated for over 25 years the grime and dirt had time to build up in the fine crevices and lines of the lions and rosettes in the door surround. Chemical stripping could not safely or sufficiently remove this dirt, so meticulous effort was taken to remove the grime by hand with delicate hand tools including chisels and scrapers to strip away layers of buildup. The doors were then sanded to refine the finish and create a smooth surface for application of the new varnish. The surround and doors require several layers of varnish to achieve the final finish which will not only improve the appearance of the doors but will protect them from weather and the sun's rays. This process requires each individual layer of varnish to dry before applying the next so this portion of the preservation work is the most time consuming. Aside from the treatment of the wood, some small repairs were made to the carvings, and the hinges of the doors will be replaced.

Unique for Amesbury in its Romanesque style, the original front doors complement the library's stately aesthetic and welcome visitors with their beauty and delicate craftsmanship. We are excited to see them shine again! *This project was completed in October 2020.*

The 2019-2020 school year was without a doubt the most challenging academic year in our lifetimes. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, all Amesbury schools were closed on March 13, 2020. For the remainder of the school year teachers and students transitioned into a remote learning model. The staff of the Amesbury Public Schools continue to take pride in the accomplishments of our students in these challenging times both in academics and in service to others throughout the community. It is our belief that if you demonstrate care and compassion for students, then the students will emulate that behavior towards others. These beliefs are ingrained in the work that our staff does every day. This belief, paired with the drive to provide every student the highest quality education possible, allows the children of Amesbury to continue to grow and achieve.

Amesbury Public Schools continues to use the Understanding by Design (UbD) framework as a process to re-envision, align, and integrate social emotional learning competencies in the Pre-K-12 curriculum. There are three stages to the UbD curriculum design process. In stage one, teachers consider goals, examine established content standards, and review curriculum expectations. In stage two, teachers consider the assessment evidence needed to document and targeted learning outcomes will be achieved. Finally, in stage three, teachers design lessons and units to align to established goals.

FY20 Accomplishments

- Full day Kindergarten was successfully implemented at the elementary level. The benefits of full day kindergarten include additional time to provide social thinking curriculum to students with time to internalize at a reasonable pace, as well as more “free choice time” to strengthen social emotional learning.
- On October 8th, 2020 Amesbury voters approved the building of a new Amesbury Elementary School. The new AES will be built adjacent to the Cashman Elementary School and is currently scheduled to open January 2023.
- The Amesbury Middle School made significant academic gains as part of their Turnaround Plan. Due to the school making substantial progress towards prescribed improvement targets the district was informed that AMS was moved into the “not requiring assistance of intervention” category by the state.



Looking Ahead

The district's immediate goal is to provide a safe and consistent learning environment for students, teachers, and staff as we strive to reach our "new normal" during this pandemic. One of the biggest keys to achieving this goal is to overhaul the district's technology infrastructure, a significant portion of which is more than a decade out of date. The district will work closely with new IT Director Tim McCue on this important process. Another project underway is the building of a new Amesbury Elementary School and the transitions that will need to accompany its opening. The district, school committee, and city continue to work closely with our design team and project manager to make this project a success through weekly working group meetings, monthly building committee meetings, and soon through the newly implemented Amesbury Elementary School Implementation Committee.

During the 2020-2021 school year, the focus will be to ensure our lesson planning is rigorous and relevant in a remote and/or hybrid learning environment. Most of the district's professional development days will be focused on providing support for teachers to be equipped for remote learning. This includes support for the Google environment, making sure our remote learning stays aligned to the Massachusetts Curriculum Frameworks, and to provide support for learning applications as supplemental instruction for our students. We still maintain the three priority areas we established last year: ensuring high expectations for all students; using a wide variety of instructional strategies to meet the needs of all learners; and using assessment to track student growth and inform daily instruction. One way Amesbury teachers are creating high expectations for students is by creating Student Learning Objectives for every lesson. Student Learning Objectives (SLOs) along with success criteria, ensures a focus on student learning and encourages teacher reflection about the influence of their practice on student learning. This year the SLOs will be part of the Google Classroom. Amesbury has been providing professional development to teachers to help them transfer instructional strategies to an online platform—the way teachers teach in the classroom is often very different than how teachers teach online. Finally, Amesbury teachers are using both formative and summative assessments to inform instruction, to monitor student progress, and to provide appropriate and timely interventions.

Simultaneous to this district-wide focus, are building-based initiatives. The elementary schools continue to ensure there is both a horizontal and vertical alignment to the standards and to have common agreement about the scope and sequence of the curriculum at both schools. In addition, the two schools are currently implementing the new literacy program Wit & Wisdom, and are using a new supplemental program, STMath. Under the direction of the new math coach, the middle school continues to address the gap in mathematics between subgroups and the general education population. Grades 5 & 6 are using STMath as a supplemental program to deepen student's conceptual understanding of math, and grades 7 & 8 are using a new math program called Desmos math. Additionally, the middle school is working towards implementing a STEM pathway through a new science program called Project Lead the Way. The high school will continue to explore offering more elective options through the new schedule, as well as explore more pathways (including STEM) to career readiness through its partnerships with area colleges and universities.

Ultimately all curriculum work and the professional development to support it, is to ensure Amesbury Public School students have access to a rigorous curriculum and are provided with equitable supports on their paths to growth, success and achievement.



The accomplishments of the Amesbury Public Schools in this challenging and unprecedented time are a result of the hard work and unwavering dedication of the teachers, staff, parents, students, and community at large. I wish to thank all those who contribute in so many ways to our continued success. It is sincerely appreciated.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHT:

AMS Turnaround Plan

In the fall of 2018 the Amesbury Middle School received notice from the state that the school's overall classification required assistance or intervention and the reasoning for the classification was we were in need of focused/targeted support for low subgroup performance in the high needs category. As a result of the classification the middle school was required to work with the state to develop a Turnaround Plan. This process started in January 2019 and the completed Turnaround Plan was required to be submitted in June 30, 2019. The Turnaround Plan would go into effect in September 2019.

Prior to the completion of the plan the school immediately took steps over the course of the school year to make improvements. School wide effort was made in posting standards and objectives in every classroom. Not only were standards posted but the expectation was to raise the rigor for students in order to meet or exceed grade level standards for all students. Administration attended all Curriculum Planning Time (CPT) blocks with grades to have focused discussions in regards to teaching and learning. Targeted Interventions took place during Curriculum Enrichment blocks. The entire school consistently engaged in computer based practice sessions over the course of the school year. Grade levels looked over data and identified trends that informed them of their instructional practices and how these practices needed to be adjusted. The school wide CARE program helped to build positive behaviors and practices that involved staff and students through school based assemblies run by students. Chronic absenteeism was monitored closely throughout the school year and school counselors and administration reached out to families to provide assistance and guidance around the importance of coming to school.

In the fall of 2019 the Amesbury Middle School received notice from the state that as a result of the spring MCAS 2019 computer based test the Amesbury Middle School overall classification moved into not requiring assistance or intervention and the reason for this new classification was because the school made substantial progress towards improvement targets.

Amesbury Middle School increased its percentage of possible points from 11% in 2018 to 86% in 2019. The middle school percentile rank rose from the 19th %ile in 2018 to the 41st %ile in 2019. The middle school exceeded their targets in 16 out of 22 categories and met or improved targets in 20 of the 22 categories. As a result of the new classification the middle school did not require any assistance from the state because of the gains it had made. To the right is a chart that reflects the school's improvement prior to completion and implementation of Turnaround Plan.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and healthy. It has been a challenging year to say the least amidst the COVID-19 pandemic. Whether you are a resident seeking unemployment help, a small business owner in need of financial assistance, or someone just trying to navigate the dense influx of information out there, my team is here to ensure your questions are answered.

In the Senate, we continue to fight to increase testing, access to personal protective equipment (PPE), medical care and coverage, and resources for our first responders. Simultaneously we are working to address challenges faced by our hospitals, local businesses, public safety departments, homeless shelters, schools, daycares and beyond - along with the challenges faced by all of the people each sector has employed or served.

Among the pertinent bills signed into law was legislation I filed to allow mixed drinks to be sold with takeout and delivery orders during the emergency. This was a crucial step in helping our mom and pop establishments who have faced great challenges in their efforts to retain employees and pay their bills. Beyond the response to COVID-19, it has been a productive legislative session as the Senate made progress on a host of issues crucial to our region.

In a development so important to our City and communities across Massachusetts, the Legislature and Governor's Administration committed to maintaining Fiscal Year 2021 local and school aid at last year's levels – and to provide additional funding in school aid to cover inflation and enrollment factors.

The Governor this year signed into law legislation authorizing the City of Amesbury to issue additional liquor licenses at Maples Crossing. This marked a key step toward bringing this project – which will create jobs and boost our local economy – to life.

Included in a bond bill passed by the Senate is an amendment I sponsored for funding toward important Amesbury Public Schools technology and infrastructure upgrades. We also secured, through the Senate's transportation bond bill, funding for water line infrastructure improvements along Main Street, Merrill Street and Old Merrill Street.

We have gotten the Merrimack River District Commission – a coalition of experts, elected officials and environmental groups, among others – off the ground to work together and advise the Legislature on how to proceed to restore our majestic Merrimack so that it may be here for future generations to enjoy. Moreover, we secured funding toward a pre-notification alert pilot program that will inform swimmers and boaters about pollution hazards in the river.

Among the other bills recently passed by the Senate are the PACT Act, comprehensive legislation aimed at addressing the rapidly increasing costs of prescription drugs, and the Mental Health ABC Act, legislation that seeks to increase access by removing barriers to timely quality care.

While we have made progress on these and other issues, there remains much work to be done. If you have any ideas or questions regarding legislation, or ever need assistance on any matter, please let me know.

It is a privilege and honor to serve you in the Massachusetts House of Representatives. Thank you for the opportunity to represent our community.

While there is no doubt that this year brought unprecedented challenges to residents, business owners, and members of the work force alike, this year has also brought many accolades to the City of Amesbury.

As COVID-19 has shifted many aspects of our daily lives online, one of the more opportune achievements of this past year was the funding secured through the IT Bond Bill. This provided funding for information technology equipment upgrades to Amesbury Public Schools. Additionally, I helped acquire a \$50,000 Grant for School Safety, administered by the Executive Office of Public Safety and Security, to upgrade security systems in all Amesbury Public School buildings. Expanding equitable access to education, in light of obstacles exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic, will continue to be one of my top priorities.

I have also worked to promote a variety of the City's much needed updates to infrastructure. I acquired \$1,000,000 in funding through the Economic Bond Bill for demolition of the abandoned Microfab Inc. facility on Route 110. I utilized MassDOT's Complete Streets Grant program to create new crosswalks with advanced warning signage to reduce pedestrian and vehicle accidents. I obtained funding through the Executive Office of Housing and Economic Development's MassWorks Grant to improve South Hunt Road by including safety upgrades. Lastly, through the Department of Housing and Community Development's Community Development Block Grant, I secured funding for housing rehabilitation assistance, ADA improvements to City Hall, and social services providing homelessness assistance and to support Our Neighbor's Table.

Resiliency has become an integral part of planning for municipalities across the Commonwealth in order to protect important from environmental change. The Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs' 2020 Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness Planning and Action Grants awarded Amesbury an Open Space and Recreation Plan, to ensure that Amesbury will continue to be a wonderful place to live, work, and raise a family.
