Dear Mayor Gove, Members of the Planning Board, Conservation Commission, Municipal Council and School Committee;

This recent quote from Mayor Gove illustrates that our leaders are aware of the need to preserve what we have. We trust that our concerns will be heard and taken seriously. Please accept this list of names as an indication of the following Amesbury citizens' desire to relocate AES to 24 South Hampton Road. In three weeks, during a pandemic, we have gathered more than 1,300 names of concerned Amesbury residents. It is important to note that more than three dozen of those names are teachers, paraprofessionals, retired teachers, and other school staff. As a community, we should be excited about the building of a new school. It should be seen as a positive advancement in our town. Instead, this project is causing unrest.

Even during this unprecedented time accompanied by an unknown economic future, the overwhelming majority of taxpayers in our town recognize the need and are willing to pay for a new/renovated school. However, this project is not what they want. We have repeatedly asked to hear from supporters of the project to clarify why this plan is best. We have not been given an answer other than the \$24 million funding from the MSBA. Being awarded this money from the state does not mean this is the best plan for our town. In the beginning of the feasibility study, the 'pros/cons' listed the CES site as an easier location including less construction time and no wetlands involvement. It was never stated as better for any other reason. We have new information. This site does involve wetlands and extensive water mitigation.

In the presence of this new information and the unknown future of education, we are

asking you to please pause and rethink the plan. This decision affects our city now and further affects future generations. Please make the right decision.

Issues and Facts re: New AES school project at the Cashman Site at 193 Lions Mouth Road:

1. A citizen majority (67% in 2019) wanted the new school to remain on the *existing* site.
2. The city's MSBA-approved project management company estimated a \$13-40 million project cost in the Request for Designer in 2018 just before the architect was hired. Those numbers align with similar school projects.
3. The state awards more points to reuse a site.
 - That means a greater percentage of the project cost on the existing site would be covered by the state.
 - *Another concern related to the pandemic: if the state is no longer able to pay its share of the \$60 million project at the Cashman site, Amesbury citizens will shoulder an even greater tax burden.*
4. **Construction at the Cashman site requires \$\$\$ millions of unfunded and untallied repercussions:**
 - Rebuild 2 baseball fields/utilities/snackbar on Woodsom Farm.
 - Rebuild existing soccer fields deeper into Woodsom Farm (and likely provoke a lawsuit).
 - Bussing an entire neighborhood of children through downtown to an already congested site, with additional individual costs to those families (last year individual riders \$250 with \$450/family cap).
 - Cost to retrofit/upgrade Cashman School for Grades 3-5.
 - Upgrade traffic intersections and add sidewalks for child safety.
 - Maintain 4+ acres of new parking lots/access roads/and elaborate stormwater solutions.
 - Annual maintenance for stormwater solutions, including specialized maintenance for porous pavement.
 - Address subsequent flooding issues in the Cashman School neighborhood (and potential lawsuits) that exacerbate existing neighborhood flooding and wetness/mold issues at CES.
 - Replace the \$200,000 rubber-lined playground surface every 10 years.
 - Repurpose the abandoned AES school building while still paying to resolve existing stormwater issues.
 - Impacts to likely vernal pool in wooded area below lower baseball field. A 2018 photo of a blue-spotted salamander is available.
5. **Building at the existing AES site shaves \$\$\$ millions off the building cost, as it will NOT require:**
 - Extensive new utilities, parking lots, and access roads.
 - Stormwater management for 7+ acres of impervious surfaces.
 - A state-of-the-art adult-sized gymnasium for K-2 students.
 - A rubber-lined playground.
 - Repurposing an abandoned school.
6. **A recent 3rd-party review uncovered stormwater and wetland-related issues at the Cashman site requiring costly solutions and waivers, yet wetland issues were presented as the primary reason not to use the existing AES site.**
 - A stormwater drain system is already in place at the existing AES site. It is in disrepair and likely undersized due to increased stormwater from hillside development and roof gutters draining directly to the foundation. Repairs will address the increased flooding contributing to "wetland" appearance.
7. **According to Amesbury's Municipal Vulnerability Plan: "Woodsom Farm and surrounding undeveloped areas stood out as providing significant ecological climate resiliency, flood control, water quality, and wildlife habitat value."**
 - The plan also cites the need to repair and enlarge the culvert at the corner of the AES property that passes beneath South Hampton Road to address flooding issue. In fact, that culvert connects to the stormwater system in disrepair at AES.
 - Relocation of athletic fields is proposed within Amesbury's "Wetland Resources Protection District," historic deed-protected open space, as well as wetland buffer zones. Field construction may be blocked or open to lawsuit.
8. **The 98,000 SF Cashman site building design was deemed 30,000 square feet in excess of state guidelines, and pre-K construction portion of the costs are NOT covered by the state.**

It is in the state's best interest to approve a second request to amend the location to the existing site, given the \$\$\$ millions of dollars in savings and far fewer impacts to public natural resources. *In 2019, the state approved amending Amesbury's Feasibility Study to change grade configuration and move the project site to Cashman.*
